### Speakers' Biographical Sketches

#### Carlos Campo, M.D.

Tallahassee Pulmonary Clinic  
Tallahassee, FL

Dr. Campo received his M.D. degree from the Universidad Autonoma de Centro America in San Jose, Costa Rica, followed by an internship and residency at the Mount Sinai Medical Center in Miami, Florida. He then did 4 years of fellowship training in Pulmonary/Critical Care medicine at the University of Miami's Jackson Memorial Hospital. Following 4 years of private practice in Miami, he established his practice at the Tallahassee Pulmonary Clinic. Dr. Campo also serves as a Clinical Assistant Professor of Medicine at the FSU College of Medicine. He has several referred journal articles and is a Fellow in the American College of Physicians/American Society of Internal Medicine.

#### Tyron C. Hoover, M.D., J.D.

Dr. Hoover received his undergraduate degree from Southern Methodist University (SMU) and his M.D. degree from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, both in Dallas, TX. Following a year of general surgery internship and four years of medical residency in pathology at the Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas, he then returned to school to earn a J.D. degree from the SMU Dedman School of Law. In 2005, Dr. Hoover joined the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center and Research Institute in Tampa, FL to direct their Biospeciman Repository and their Total Cancer Care Project. He is both fully licensed by the Florida Board of Medicine and is a Member of the Florida Bar.

#### John Janik, M.D.

Co-Director of Clinical Trials Team  
National Cancer Institute  
Bethesda, MD

Dr. Janik received his M.D. from The Ohio State University College of Medicine and then conducted basic research at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases in Bethesda, Maryland. He then returned to clinical medicine completing training in internal medicine at Baylor College of Medicine Affiliated Hospitals in Houston, Texas and fellowship training in Hematology-Oncology at University Hospitals, Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. He returned to the National Institutes of Health where he joined the Biological Response Modifiers Program, in the National Cancer Institute in Frederick, MD. He assumed his current role as the Co-Director of the Clinical Trials Team in the Metabolism Branch at the National Cancer Institute in 1999. Dr. Janik has published over 100 articles and abstracts on the treatment of cancer and lectures nationally and internationally on the use of monoclonal antibodies for the treatment of lymphoma.

**John W. McBroom, M.D.**

Dr. McBroom just recently established his gynecological oncology practice in Tallahassee after serving as the Chief of the Division of Gynecology at Tripler Army Medical Center, where he maintained academic appointments as Assistant Professor at both University of Hawaii and the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. He received his medical degree from the Medical College of Georgia, and completed residency training at Tripler Army Medical Center in Honolulu, Hawaii. He completed fellowship training in Gynecologic Oncology at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. where he also served as a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the National Cancer Institute. Dr. McBroom is board certified in Gynecologic Oncology and is a fellow of both the American College of Surgeons and Society of Gynecologic Oncologists. He has numerous presentations and journal publications to his credit.

Dr. Murrah has served on the Tallahassee Memorial Hospital Cancer Committee and also on the faculty of the FSU College of Medicine. He is a member of several professional medical societies, including the American College of Surgeons and the Southeaster Surgical Congress.

**Matthew W. Robertson, M.D.**

Dr. Robertson attended the University of Virginia School of Medicine and then completed a residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB). He then completed a fellowship in Gynecologic Oncology at UAB. The rigorous surgical training Dr. Robertson received at UAB involved radical pelvic surgery, surgical management of all gynecologic cancers, urogynecologic procedures, and pelvic reconstructive surgery for support defects. Dr. Robertson has been active in medical and scientific research since medical school and has authored multiple papers published in medical journals. While at UAB, his research focused on gene therapy applications for ovarian cancer. In addition to ovarian cancer, Dr. Robertson has a special interest in endometrial cancer, including the laparoscopic management of this disease.
